Principal discussed the curriculum with the HOD'S of all departments and seek their suggestions regarding the effective implementation of curriculum during the academic session. Keeping in mind the curriculum college frame different committees for the smooth functioning of the college. Time table committee of the college prepares time table and the same is circulated to all departments for information. The time table is also pasted on the notice boards of different blocks for widely spread of information among the students. Heads of the department convened the curriculum implementation strategies junior/fresh faculty and offer them suggests, encourage them to develop teaching aids and materials. The departmental timetable was also prepared and the care was taken to see it so that it is getting executed properly. The workload is distributed to the staff-members. The college supports and facilitates the participation of faculty members in seminars, workshops, conferences, and refresher and orientation courses for excellence in different criterias. The College has well equipped library which provides the facilities like INFLIB- NET, E-Journals, Xerox machine, internet facility for the convenience of the staff and students. It has been also noticed that certain courses demand practical knowledge to gain insights from the curriculum. To cater to the needs of such courses, the departments organises field visits. The convenor of the examination committee declares the dates of the College Examinations well in advance so that students get ample time to prepare for examinations and the teachers complete the curriculum in time. The head of the department takes review of the departmental activities from time to time. The departments analyze the results at the end of the examinations to gauge the learning outcomes of the students. The remedial coaching helps the needy students to do better in their examinations.

2.3.2 STUDENTS MENTORING SYSTEM AVAILABLE IN THE INSTITUTION. The mentoring system of college ensures that the students adapt to the dynamic learning environment and lead their ways into highly successful careers. The institute has an integrated mentoring system where the faculty acts as a link between the students and the institution and perform the following functions: Mentors are assigned to monitor and guide students through all the three years. Mentors coordinate with the parents regarding the progress of the students. Mentors also keep a track of the mentees' performance during the summer internship by continuous interaction with the industry guide designated to the student by the college. Mentors communicate with fellow faculty and promote mentees at the time of difficulty / opportunity to help them develop further in their areas of interest. The HODs (Head of the Department) of various Departments also supervise and monitor different activities of the assigned mentors and the students. The HODs hold a meeting of all mentors of his/her department at least once a month for the reviewing of proper implementation of the system and accordingly suggest and advise mentors whenever necessary. ### 2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The College has adopted a method of Continuous internal evaluation method through internal assessments held in accordance with the University Statues. The University of Jammu, to which this college is affiliated, has introduced Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in this academic year and consequently this college has also adopted CBCS for the Semesters I and II. It involves more choices for students in terms of skill courses and generic courses and a comprehensive evaluation of the students understanding of the subject is done through internal assessments. Moreover, regular class tests, oral tests, seminars and quizzes also serve as a method of preparation for the subsequent internal assessment examinations. The internal practical examinations are also held strictly as per the university guidelines.

### 2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

During this session the college was affiliated to the University of Jammu. Therefore, the College prepared the academic Calendar in conformity with the calendar adopted by the university of Jammu. The calendar has been prepared to



ensure implementation of Curriculum and participation in Extracurricular and co-curricular Activities. As per the university rules and regulation, academic activities run in college throughout the year. At the beginning of session institution prepares an academic calendar to organise the curricular and extracurricular activities in the institution. In preparing the academic calendar the institute adheres to the available working days, Summer Vacations, Diwali Break, Winter Vacations, Holi Break and other national and Gazetted Holidays. Admission process starts at the commencement of the odd semesters and is completed by the end of August. In case of exceptional cases, sometimes the college extends the admission process by one week. First internal assessments are conducted in the month of October and March for odd and even semesters respectively. In case of PG Mathematics one more internal assessment is also held in the following month. A time period of ten days preceding the date of commencement of examination is provided to the students. Final examinations are held in the month of December and May for Odd semesters and even semesters respectively. The final examinations for the students of this college are held in the examination halls and class rooms in accordance with the seating plan prepared in advance by the college Examination wing. In order to ensure fairness and transparency in the conduct of the examination a sufficient number of supervisors and invigilators are appointed. Strict vigilance including visits by external flying squads and internal squads is adopted for the conduct of the examination. The head of the institution personally supervises all the examination centres in order to ensure robustness.

The College Development Committee headed by the Principal looks after the development, maintenance and utilization of the College physical facilities. College has 2 boys hostels- Old Block and New Block with a total capacity of 140 and functional since 1993 and 2002, respectively. The college also has a 24 bedded girl's hostel completed and functional since 2016-17. For the maintenance of a clean campus environment, grade IV staff are assigned to various jobs and duties - cleaning of all rooms, corridors, compound, etc on regular basis. Skilled workers are hired for repair works relating to buildings, furniture, etc. The NSS and NCC Units of the College organize cleanliness drive under Swatch Bharat mission after regular class work. The college has 14 functional laboratories. The computer laboratories offers proficiency programmes in Information Technology. Short term computer courses are organized for students, teaching faculty and staff from time to time. Respective laboratories are maintained by the respective departments. The college has a well equipped Library having more than 50,000 standard text and reference books. The Library Committee with the Principal as the chairperson and librarian as one of the member along with 3-5 senior faculty members tackle all issues related to the smooth and efficient functioning of the library. Newly admitted students are issued library /identity cards valid till the final

semester. Internet facility is available in the library and students can access the facility for availing e-resources and other web based information. Photostat facility is also available in the library at nominal rates. Library also has AC in the reading rooms and working area with power backup facilities. The College has sports ground including volley ball court where outdoors sports activities are held. The college also has an indoor stadium for badminton, table tennis etc. The sports committee of the College is in the charge of the sports complex and equipments. The committee supervises the Grounds-men and Grade IV staff assigned for maintenance and repair works. Some classrooms are equipped with the required teaching audio visual aids to supplement the teaching-learning process. Seminars, workshops, lecture sessions are also conducted in these rooms. Class representatives, elected by the students, are given the responsibility to keep the classrooms clean. Checking of fans, teaching aids etc in the classroom are done regularly. College has a hygienic canteen outsourced to a private vendor. Hygienic food is made available at affordable rates. The canteen is open on all working days.

Title Motivational and Social Services of NSS for Responsible Citizen

Objectives The Objectives of NSS At Govt M.A.M. College, Jammu are 1. To identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem solving process. 2. To extend Communal harmony. 3. To inculcate a sense belongingness and social responsibility. 4. To utilize their knowledge in generating practical solution to individual and community problems. 5. To develop leadership qualities. 6. To enhance community participation. 7. To develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters. The Context: To foster a spirit of camaraderie and love for humanity in general and rural folk in particular, facilities are provided to willing students with a desire for social service, to put in their best, for alleviating the suffering of the sick, and the downtrodden. The NSS Squad work under the able guidance of well trained senior staff members who guide them properly and chalk out programme for Voluntary Social Service. There is an advisory committee of NSS to facilitate it's working. The College has three units of NSS, each consisting of 100 volunteers, each unit functions under a programme officer. The students have to apply on a prescribed form for seeking admission to each unit. Students enrolled as NSS volunteers are required to put in at least 120 hours of social work and attend one camp of 10 days duration to become eligible to receive certificate. The Practice NSS volunteers of Govt Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu conducts a wide range of activities like cleanliness programme, special summer/winter camp, surveys, plantation drives, observance of important days and awareness campaign, blood donation, hygiene and prevention of various disease like Cancer, AIDS, Malaria, Diarrhoea etc. Awareness about appropriate precautions during disasters like earthquake, flood etc. The motto of the NSS "NOT ME BUT YOU" and the spirit of the students to do, learn and involve with activities. Each NSS unit is expected to adopt a nearby village/slum and work for its all round development. Regular activities and special camps should preferably be organised in the adopted village/rural unit/slum for this purpose. NSS volunteers generally work in villages, slums and voluntary agencies to complete 120 hours of regular activities during an academic year.

Adoption of Villages Adoption of a village and area is a very meaningful programme in NSS. It is far better to concentrate attention on one village and take up the task for development perspective, than to fritter away energy in many locations involving too many activities which may not be completed at all or where the follow up action may not be possible. Adoption of Slums Most of the colleges and universities are usually located in the urban areas. Due to long distance between the college campuses and the villages, the visits to the adopted villages by the NSS volunteers may become expensive and time consuming. In view of this, it is desirable to adopt slum especially by colleges located in urban areas. Survey of the Village/Area Before drawing up the plan of action, it is absolutely necessary to conduct a comprehensive survey of few villages situated at a short distance from the college. The assistance from the teachers and students of agriculture, economics, commerce, geography, statistics, home science, social work, medicine, psychology and education etc. have to be sought for the purpose. Survey of the Slums of near by area For

adoption of a slum, there should be composite survey team consisting of students drawn from faculties like, Arts, Science, Engineering, Medicine, Home Science and Social Work etc. The selected areas should be compact and should be easily accessible for students. 2.Objectives of the Practice : Psychological well being is very important in present scenario as there is tremendous pressure on students to perform well. When students enter the college they are in an age group of 19 years, which is very crucial time. This is the time when children are working hard for their identity and this is the time when they get easily distracted and get trapped in ill practices. Drug abuse is a one such threat. Moreover students who join college are from different Economic, Social, Cultural and religious background.

Some boys and Girls joining the institution are not from co-ed Schools. It become Cultural shock for some students. Apart from this psychological problems vary from student to student. The objective of Psychological Counselling Cell of Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial college,Jammu is to plays an important role in helping students to overcome their psychological problems. Psychological

Counselling Cell fallow basics ethics of counselling by maintaining privacy of the student seeking psychological counselling. 3. The Context : Counselling is very technical process as counsellor has to invade into personal thought process and related event of the client for dealing with the issues client.

Empathy on part of counsellor is very important for understanding the severity of the issues. Moreover college students are from a very tender age group.

Their issues are very sensitive which need special attention. Maintaining secrecy and privacy of client (student/staff) some time become difficult as counselling is done in working hours of the college. Besides this counselling needs personal space free from distraction. To create such space in the college become difficult. Psychological Counselling Cell of Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial college,Jammu uses free space available in the college rather than designating

a particular room for psychological counselling. This helps in maintaining privacy of the client. Availability of space is checked from the time table, which can be free classroom, laboratory of Psychology Deptt., Conference Hall etc. Students who require psychological counselling approach convener/members of Psychological Cell. A suitable time and venue for counselling is intimated to the student. 4 The Practice:India is facing a great problem of drug abuse and delinquency (young children committing suicide).This need to be addressed

and psychological counselling is best way to deal with such problems.Understanding the importance of Psychological counselling union Govt.

of India has also started psychological counselling in Educational Institutions. Trained counsellors are required in School and Colleges. Because students at different levels face different psychological problems. If not addressed will definitely affect the academic performance of a student. Major constraint and limitations are proper space for counselling and awareness among students for voluntarily seeking psychological counselling. In this regard Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu has setup its own psychological Counselling Cell with Head of the Dept. Of psychology as its convener.

5. Evidence of Success : Special workshops are organised. Trained psychologists are invited for technical sessions. Psychological Counselling Cell of Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial college, Jammu has organised different awareness programmes. To bring awareness among students/staff frequent workshops need to be organised and Psychological Counselling Cell of Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial college, Jammu is trying its level best for psychological well being of its students and staff.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required As there is no separate provision for psychological evaluation of student seeking admission to the Constituent Colleges of Cluster University of Jammu. There is lack of awareness among students coming from varied backgrounds to the College. There is lot of hesitation among students to seek psychological counselling. It becomes difficult to identify the students who actually require psychological counselling. Although Psychological Counselling Cell of Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial college, Jammu organise program

Martyrs Day is celebrated in the memory of Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria On 28th September every year Martyrs Day or Shaheed Diwas is celebrated in the memory of Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria to pay tribute to extraordinary bravery and supreme sacrifices by the son of the soil. No doubt, he has sacrificed his life for the safety and security of the country. He is a source of inspiration for the young students of the college. At such a young age, he came forward to serve the nation. On 27th September 2011 he fought with bravery against terrorist. So, to pay homage to Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria Martyrs Day is celebrated on 28th September every year. Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria was born on 28 Aug 1985 in district Samba of Jammu and Kashmir. Son of an army veteran Nb. Subedar Som Dutt Khajuria, Lt Khajuria completed his schooling from Kendriya Vidyalaya No. 1, Gandhi Nagar, Jammu. He was second among four siblings with elder brother Anil, younger brother Sunil and sister Deepika. He joined the Officers' Training Academy (OTA) after completing his graduation from Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu, and was commissioned into the Army Service Corps on 20 March 2010. Lt Sushil Khajuria though commissioned into ASC was deputed to 18 Grenadiers unit deployed in JK as his first operational assignment. Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria joined the unit at Panzgam on 14 April 2010. He was made the Ghatak Platoon Commander from the beginning and was soon in combat, conducting counter-terrorist operations in the treacherous mountainous terrain of the frontiers of Kupwara in Jammu and Kashmir. His first real encounter was on 29 July 2011, where he gave an excellent account of himself and the battalion was successful in neutralizing one hardcore terrorist. Kupwara Operation: 28 Sep 2011 On 28 September 2011, Lt Sushil Khajuria was leading his team in a rugged and difficult terrain with steep slopes and thick undergrowth, simultaneously, coordinating movements with four other teams based on specific input by higher formation headquarters and a

neighbouring formation about the presence of an infiltration column of approximately 5 to 6 terrorists in the general area of Kopra, in Kupwara district. The teams were launched on a search and destroy mission to deal with the terrorists. While scouting a nullah, his team came under heavy fire. With his buddy having pinned down by the terrorist fire and realizing that the terrorists were entrenched in an advantageous position behind a big rock, Lt Sushil Khajuria crawled through thick foliage to a flank and spotted the terrorists under covering fire from his team. Unmindful of his personal safety, he charged at the terrorists, up the slope, killing two of them. During the operation Havaldar Ravi Kumar, the leading scout of another team got shot by the terrorists at around 10.30 hrs and was severely injured. Hav. Kumar could not move, under fire from the terrorists. Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria then volunteered to retrieve the injured Hav. Ravi Kumar. While crawling towards Hav, Lt Sushil Khajuria was fired
