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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Maulana Azad Memorial College Jammu basks in a glorious historical past. Maharaja Sir Partap Singh opened 'Prince of Wales' College in December, 1905 to commemorate the visit of Prince of Wales (the future King George V). The College was renamed as 'Govt. Gandhi Memorial College' on 20th May, 1948 and further bifurcated into Govt. Gandhi Memorial Arts College and Govt. Memorial Science College on 20th September, 1954 to meet the growing demands of students. Govt. Gandhi Memorial Arts College was shifted to its present location on 23rd September, 1960 and renamed as Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu after Jb. Maulana Abul Kalam Azad, the first Minister for Education in the Indian Government. The building of the College has an imposing 'facade'. There are separate blocks for Arts and Languages, Science Block and New Block, Library, Indoor sports complex, Boys and Girls Hostels and Canteen and Administrative block. Besides, one Auditorium and Swimming pool shall be ready for use of students from the next Academic session i.e. 2022.

MAM College as a constituent college of Cluster University of Jammu, aims at holistic learning research, inevitable yearning to break away from the path of mediocrity, thus helping the young learners to hone their creative skills and become self sufficient. The college has 68 regular faculty members in various disciplines and 46 members on the non-teaching staff. The college has a web-enabled Central Library with over 5700 titles in various disciplines. The Library is linked to the UGC sponsored INFLIBNET, enabling on-line access to varied national and international research journals.

The faculty have published books and research papers in national and international journals. The college regularly conducts endowment lectures, inter-disciplinary seminars and invited talks by experts, on Career counselling, Psychological Counselling and varied Academic interactions on pertinent topics like Nature Conservation, Save Water, Fit India etc including celebrating important days and events. The college has become a role model in co9nducting extension activities. The college has recently initiated two industrial skill courses in CCNA and Soft Skills & Personality Development in collaboration with NIELIT and Central University of Jammu.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college focuses on quality education, lays stress on ethical and moral values and draws its objectives by understanding the needs of the society. The curriculum is designed and implemented taking cognizance of the UGC, State and Central Government Policies. As per the statutes of the Cluster University of Jammu all heads of departments are members of Board of Studies and contribute in framing and updating of the curriculum.

In the session 2016-17 Maulana Azad Memorial College was affiliated with the University of Jammu. Hence, College adopted the curriculum framed by the University of Jammu for its affiliated colleges. In the session (2017-18) college became a constituent college of Cluster University of Jammu and therefore curriculum framed by the University was adopted for the various programmes in the college. In the same session, two new programmes, UG Physics honors and UG Mathematics honors were introduced in the College. In the session 2018-19 PG Music was also introduced in the college. The college boasts of highly qualified faculty having

immense academic and research experience.

Conventional classroom teaching is blended with use of ICT to make the teaching-learning process more learner-centric. It is also supplemented with seminars, workshops, special lectures and tutorials, departmental quiz, projects, group assignments, term-papers, educational tours, field trips and industrial visits for effective delivery of curriculum. Theory & Practical classes are held according to the Time-Table which is prepared prior to the commencement of the academic year by the Time-Table Committee and is displayed on the notice boards and college website for ease of the students.

The feedback is taken in a positive manner and further communicated to the members of the board of studies through its various representatives. The framing of curriculum is the sole prerogative of the affiliating university. The college analyzes the implementation of the course curriculum through the performance evaluation of students. It comprises term wise examinations, continuous assessment, practical test, course work assessment (written and practical assignments), participation in the events, debates, etc. Personality development seminars / workshops are conducted from time to time to develop interpersonal and communication skills of the students.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The students are admitted on merit basis in General courses and entrance-based for honors courses. The centralised admission process ensures transparency by making it totally online and computer driven with no manual intervention and taking into account reservation rules. The college promotes e-learning for the enhanced learning experience. All the classrooms in the new building are furnished with Smart Boards, LCD Projectors, Computers, and Internet Connectivity. Teachers combine traditional teaching methods with use of modern teaching aids. Remedial courses and elaborate tutorial sessions are aimed at supporting learners in small groups so that teachers can provide individual support. Special attention is given to students with special needs and also from economically weaker sections. Students are also supported through a well-designed mentor ward system as displayed College website. The Evaluation process is transparent. Students are evaluated in a continuous assessment system, comprising written examinations (minor and major), group discussions, assignments, analytical tests, practicals and projects. Through internal assessment students are encouraged and guided to improve their responses with more than one attempt at times.

The college also encourages its staff to undertake research activities to enhance their academic qualifications. Teachers are encouraged to pursue Ph.D. and work on different projects. Out of the total full-time teachers, 32 are PhD holders and many are currently pursuing PhD through part-time mode. Keeping in mind NEP-2020, College is now also focusing on developing Research Culture by establishing Research Hub Centre in the college. The overall pass percentage of our outgoing students at the University exams is impressive with 75% in the last academic session (2020-21) in all streams.

The college has a rich multi-sectional, reader friendly library having a circulation centre, technical section, stack area, reference section, in-house Xerox activity, outer reading hall, text book, periodical section, digital corner, lounge area for browsing and relaxed reading. Access to the e-resources is provided through NLIST program of INFLIBNET (UGC). The reading hall remains open on all weekdays before and during Examination days and remains open during summer / autumn and Winter Break.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research and innovation plays a central role in the advancement of societies and economies fostering economic growth, strengthen technological progress, and enhance job creation. Extension activities focus on building new friendships, learning study skills, navigating personal choices, exposure to diversity, and creating a responsible adult. To achieve the best possible results, the institute has taken the following measures:

- Research Hub and spoke: The college is a research hub for social sciences and spoke for mass communication and multimedia and music and fine arts and languages.
- ICT-enabled classrooms- To create a better teaching-learning environment, the institution has adopted the practice of ICT-enabled teaching.
- Emphasis on E-content: To facilitate the creation and dissemination of e-content, the college also has an E-content room
- Browsing Centre: The institute has a browsing Centre for Both the students and faculty to help them in their respective areas.
- Library and laboratories: The college has automated library well equipped with relevant books for all the subjects. All the departments with experimental work have well equipped laboratories.
- Well-upgraded website: The institute has a website which provides links for all the activities going on in the college in addition to any new announcements related to their courses as well as exams.
- Industrial Skill training courses: Apart from the regular courses, the institute also offers training courses to students to form the next generation of the talent pool of Industry ready employees, innovators and entrepreneurs. The institute has signed an MOU with Central HED, Jammu to offer a course on soft skills and personality development to the students.
- Extension Activities: The institute organizes and participates in various extension activities with dual objective of not only sensitizing students about various social issues but also strengthening community participation. NCC and NSS units take part in various initiatives like, Swachh Bharat, blood donation camps, AIDS prevention, Suicide prevention, Drug Abuse road safety, plastic eradication, etc. Programs like 'Save our Lakes', tree plantation drive, cleaning of Tawi river have been taken up as part of environmental consciousness and encouraging the community to initiate steps in this regard.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The Institute also has a well maintained campus spread over 19.58 acres of land. The institution provides IT enabled teaching-learning environment in the campus round the clock. The institution has 26 classrooms, 09 ICT enabled classrooms, 02 computer labs (BBA & BCA Dept), 08 ICT enabled laboratories, 01 IT enabled Seminar Hall. The institution also has a well established Research Hub (Social Sciences), Browsing centre, Econtent creation room, and 01 Industrial Skill Centre and well equipped medical room with pharmicist. The institution is also in the process of setting up Music, Fine Arts and Languages Centre and Mass Communication and Multi Media Centre.

The college also has a canteen, playgrounds, tube well, generators, and girls common room, hostels for boys and girls. Ramps have also been constructed for specially abled. The college also takes pride in its comprehensive sports and fitness infrastructure. The outdoor sports facilities include a cricket pitch, football, hockey etc. Indoor arrangements include a badminton court and table tennis. Additionally, a Canteen Committee makes monthly visits to the Canteen, keeping regular checks on hygiene and other related areas to ensure satisfactory food experience for our students. Wi-Fi and internet facility is available, safe drinking water is available 24 hours and CCTV cameras are installed. We have 24 hours watchmen for the safety and security

of the college and hostel. The library of the college is automated and is well stocked and is spread over two floors with a total area of 396 sq meters. It is fully air-conditioned; Wi-Fi enabled with a seating capacity of 50 users. The ground floor of the library has a property counter, librarian's room, circulation (Issue/Return) counter, Online Public Access Catalogue, Text-Book Section, Periodical Section and computer access, Processing Section, and Stacks. Library is automated through ----. The college has many licensed software in the Research hub and library. The purchase committee ensures the optimal utilization of budget allocated for various activities. The college has technical staff and helpers for up keeping, cleanliness and maintenance of the campus is done on regular basis.

Student Support and Progression

Student Support and Progression has empowered students towards social inclusion and progress through student-centric financial incentives and welfare measures. The institution provides a number of scholarships and financial support to students. Economically weak and underprivileged students are given a platform to continue their studies by providing scholarships by government and non-government bodies. In a unique initiative financial assistance and support is also provided by college faculty members to economically underprivileged students on humanitarian and compassionate grounds. Students are also provided guidance for competitive examinations to prepare them for employability and social responsibility. Career counseling was made available to students to make them ready to face future endeavors. Institutional mechanism for transparency, timely address of student grievances and prevention of sexual harassment and ragging remains one of the important components of this criterion.

In the year 2018-19, an inter college cultural and a literary contest YUVTARANG was organized by Cluster University Jammu where **Karuna Majotra** and **Satinder Kumar** added another feather in the cap by winning a gold medals in classical music and light music respectively. In the session 2020-21, a student **Karan Singh** participated in the national integration camp organized by NSS Regional directorate New Delhi, sponsored by Ministry of Youth Affairs in Sports.

Sourav Chibber in the session 2016-17 won a gold medal at national level in Handball. Participation in various types of sports at inter college level in the session 2018-19 by students brought gold medals in Boxing, Discus throw, Wrestling, Power lifting and 5000 meter race. In the session 2020-21, **Samreen Kour** a female student of the college brought laurels to the institution by clinching eleven gold medals in power lifting. The performance of students in sports and cultural activities has been very good and many have won medals, awards and accolades for their outstanding performance.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Principal maintains proactive role in encouraging and motivating all faculty members for the overall academic growth and development of the college. The college has constituted a number of committees and student support services. The conveners of the respective committees hold periodic meetings and conduct activities. Personal interaction of the Principal with various stakeholders plays an important role in the functioning and growth of the college. The institute carries out external financial audits. The audit is conducted by the state govt. and Auditors from Accountant General (AG) office of the State.

The Principal and the committee of the college monitor the use of funds received from the state-Govt./UGC. The funds received from UGC/State Govt. clearly mention the purpose for which they are granted. The institute

has at its disposal the funds collected from the students as part of admission fees as local fund and can be used for the welfare of students with approval from administrative department whenever necessary. The mobilization of funds is done by the Principal as per requirement of different departments of college. The College has an advisory, development and Purchase Committee, Library and various associated bodies which help in the preparation, division, allocation and utilization of funds.

At the beginning of the every session, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college conducts meeting under the able guidance of the principal who is chairperson of IQAC with staff members of the college. IQAC discusses various aspects like teaching learning process, structure, methodology, academic practices, curricular & co-curricular activities for the session. The committee then chalks out a planned structure in the form of Activity calendar. There's a transparent management for payments of salary and any purchase made by the college. The salary of both teaching and non-teaching employees of the college is transferred through PAYSYS Software. The entire purchase of the college is done through GEM Portal. Any other payments related to purchase is also done by means of e-payment like NEFT. Scholarships are provided to the needy students under different schemes including SC, ST, Minority, Pahari etc.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Maulana Azad Memorial College, through enriched training and activities improves the confidence of the students, hones the skills needed for professional life and instills in them social and family values to make them socially responsible citizens. The college educates the students and teachers on gender equity and sensitizes them through Gender Equality Policy, Code of Conduct, Physical and Cyber Security System, Anti-ragging Committee, Internal Complaints Committee and Discipline Committee. Green campus initiatives, rainwater harvesting system, use of alternative energy resources like solar panels ensures regular involvement of students in environmental protection activities. The Mentor-Mentee system has made a qualitative difference in the academic performance and instilled self-confidence among students.

To promote gender equity, the College organizes workshops, celebrates international Women's day, lectures on women issues and women empowerment etc. The college has been awarded with Gender Equity Award of appreciation on international Girl Child Day.

Different initiatives were taken to properly manage various types of waste generated within the campus. Large number of dustbins are installed in the campus at different locations of the college for maintaining the cleanliness, with dedicated staff to maintain cleanliness and hygiene. The college has the facilities of Rain water harvesting, disabled-friendly campus, ramp facility.

To build an inclusive environment the college organised different programmes to aware the students about their rich and diverse cultural heritage, such as Modernity in work of Mirza Galib, Tributes to martyrs of Jallianwala Bagh massacre, Online Sanskrit Shlok recitation, Quiz competition on GURUMUKHI LIPI, Basant Panchami Celebration, etc.

To sensitize the students and faculty of the Institution toward the constitutional obligations: values, rights, duties and responsibilities of citizens during last five years the college has organized varied awareness

programs. Lectures on Career in Tourism, Communication and Personality Development, Soft Skills and Career Opportunities in Management have been organized by the career counseling and placement cell.

The college has evolved best practices of psychological counselling for students and faculty development program. The College has distinctive heritage of celebrating Martyr's Day in the memory of Amar Shaheed Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria (KC)(P), an ex student of the College.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The Vision of National Education Policy, to provide high quality education to develop human resources in our nation as global citizens, is well taken by the Cluster University of Jammu of which Maulana Azad Memorial college is one of the constituent college. The Higher Education Department UT of J&K has constituted a high powered committee consisting of Vice chancellors of all the Universities and Principal Secretary HED as member to coordinate the efforts for implementing NEP 2020. A discussion among the committee members was initiated on the key principles of NEP such as diversity for curriculum and pedagogy with technological innovations in teaching and learning, encouraging logical decision making and innovation, critical thinking and creativity. The Academic programmes are to be redesigned to include Multidisciplinary /Interdisciplinary courses as electives. All programmes are to be designed in such a way that students get maximum flexibility to choose elective courses offered by other Departments and entry and exit options at multiple levels.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Maulana Azad Memorial college being a constituent college of Cluster University of Jammu will follow the guidelines of the parent University in this regard.
3. Skill development:	As a constituent college of Cluster University of Jammu, the institution will adhere to the instructions regarding Skill Development Courses from the parent university as well as Higher Education Department UT of J&K as soon as the NEP 2020 is rolled out.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	As a constituent college of Cluster University of Jammu, the institution will adhere to the instructions regarding integration of Indian Knowledge System from the parent university as well as Higher Education Department UT of J&K.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The NEP 2020 lays emphasis on skill development courses, vocational courses, innovation and start up programmes and development of research eco system at the college level to strengthen the academia industry linkages so that the students passing out of the institution are easily absorbed in the market as per the current job market requirements.

- Being a constituent college of the Cluster University of Jammu, Maulana Azad Memorial College follows the Academic Calendar issued by the University at the beginning of the academic year. It clearly delineates a schedule for teaching, examination, semester break and vacations, that is strictly followed by the college to ensure smooth and efficient functioning of its teaching and administrative processes. Within the same framework, the college also prepares its own calendar of events and activities before the commencement of the Academic Session and the same is communicated to all. For transparency of functioning, both the University and the college academic calendars are placed on the college website.
- All the aforementioned information is reinforced during the collegiate and departmental orientation of new students at the beginning of academic session.
- The Principal also conducts meetings with the HOD's, faculty from individual Departments, and entire Staff including non-teaching to ensure smooth implementation of the activities as scheduled.
- For the purpose of conducting Continuous Internal Evaluation, teachers prepare their schedule of teaching, class tests and assignments in accordance with their allotted time table keeping the academic calendar and planned co-curricular activities of the college in mind.
- The college implements the examination and evaluation procedure as

- 2. Semester-wise Minor Major Test.

Gender

All the U.G. Courses in humanities e.g. Sociology, Education, Political Science, have the component related to Gender studies and Gender sensitization. In addition to this various awareness programmes, symposiums and debates are organized by the departments and college committees from time to time to sensitize and eliminate gender-based prejudice. Gender Club through its activities promotes the values of Gender equality.

Human Values

The courses of humanities and social sciences like Political Science, English, Education, Sociology etc. teach the different pedagogies, methods or programmes in order to create learning experiences for students when it comes to value questions. The curriculum of Political Science incorporates at length the Human Rights of Women, Dalits, Tribal Rights, Rights of Religious Minorities.

Professional Ethics

Incorporation of Professional Ethics is a fundamental requirement of any profession. The subjects like Marketing Management help the students to improve their personal and corporate behaviour by enhancing their knowledge and skills. Business ethics are also taught to the students so as to inculcate in them a competitive spirit along with right ethics.

Environment and Sustainability

Environmental Studies is an interdisciplinary course. The course includes the study of natural resources with emphasis on renewable energy resources, the importance of conserving the present ecosystem,

promoting biodiversity, perils of environmental pollution and raising awareness on environmental and social issues. The student volunteers of NSS wing of the college through plantation drives and cleanliness drives work for Environmental Sustainability.

For effective on-campus implementation of these values various committees have been framed which take care of these issues such as:

1. CASH (Committee Against Sexual Harassment):

The college has zero tolerance for any form of sexual harassment. We have CASH committee in the college which looks into any sort of complaints against act of ragging or sexual harassment happened on the campus or off the campus. Any complaint made to the committee is taken up and sorted out with utmost seriousness. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

To identify advanced and slow learners, we conduct "student induction" programme. Students are introduced with teaching-learning and evaluation program, college discipline, various academic and other schemes along with development and achievements of the college and students support services. We identify slow and advanced learners amongst the students through class-room discussion, surprise tests, by considering their subject knowledge and previous year's performance. A minor test is conducted to further assess the performance of the students in the current semester which helps in identifying the slow and advanced learners.

Strategies for improvement of slow learners: Strategies adopted for the academically weak students are:

- Academic and personal counselling is given to the slow learners by the concerned teachers ,mentors and the counseling cell. The teachers assess the nature of their problems and then motivate them in a friendly way to reach their academic goals.
- Remedial Classes are conducted with an aim to improve the academic performance of the slow learners, absentees and students who participate in sports and other activities.
- Group Study System is also encouraged with the help of the advanced learners.
- Bilingual explanation and discussions are imparted to the slow learners beyond the class hours for better understanding
- Problem solving sessions and additional tutorials are conducted for slow learners.
- E-content has been provided for the students so that every student even the slow learner, can have access to organized and relevant material and can study at his own pace.
- To improve the confidence level of the students, confidence building lectures are arranged.
- Extra time is allowed to slow learners to complete tasks such as reading, problem solving, and analysis of the experiment.
- Extra classes are organized to clarify doubts and re-explaining of critical topics.

Slow learners have showed a tremendous improvement in the academic activities and the motivation level among the slow learners has improved a lot through these kind of programs . Also the drop out ratio of the students at each semester has reduced considerably.

Strategies Adopted for Improvement of Advanced Learners:- Quick learners are identified through their performance in examinations, interaction in class room and laboratory, their fundamental knowledge, concept understanding and articulation abilities etc., They are provided with opportunities to develop their knowledge and skills that contributes to their academic and personal growth in the following ways:

- Coaching is given through Skill Development Programmes like Communicative English, Soft Skills and Personality Development and Computer Certificate Programs like CCNA.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to enroll in MOOC Courses like Swayam.
- Provision of additional learning and reference material.
- Students are encouraged to participate in various Seminars/ Workshops/ Inter-Collegiate

- Competitions organized by other colleges to further refine their skills and knowledge.
- Participation by the students in the in-house competitions such as Debate, Group Discussion, Problem Solving Decision Making Exercises and Quiz Programmes is also encouraged..

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Our college practices a teaching methodology that focuses on imparting education through a student-centric approach. The learning becomes more experiential, participatory and socialistic by organizing activities like group discussions, poster making, field visits, debates, quizzes, assignments, seminars, project writing, exhibitions, poetry recitation and PowerPoint presentation. The college organizes co-curricular activities, extra-curricular activities, sports and cultural events which help the students for their all-around personality developments.

Experiential learning

Our focus on experiential learning means that students will graduate with a robust professional network and career-ready skills. The faculty members foster a learning environment by teaching through demonstration, visual aids, organizing seminars, presenting papers, analysing case studies and participating and conducting quizzes on theory topics. The college invites experts from various fields to demonstrate their skills and deliver talks. Students are also taken to different organizations/industries regularly to gain insight into the internal working environment of the industry. College organises geological, geographical and environmental field trips, giving students real-world experience and opportunity to go beyond academics and gain practical knowledge.

Participatory method:

This methodology helps to transform students from being relegated to the role of passive recipients to

active and involved stakeholders, apart from boosting their confidence. Since students vary in their ability to grasp concepts, it is not possible to address the needs and expectations of individual students and expect a uniform learning outcome from them all in a teacher-centric class.

- The faculty members make learning interactive with students by motivating student participation in group discussion, PowerPoint presentation, role-play, subject quiz, discussion and questions and answers related to course topics.
- Discussions and debates on contemporary issues are encouraged and students get an opportunity to express their views.
- Programmes like Fresher's Day and Farewell parties are organized by the students themselves thereby giving them an opportunity to develop organizing skills.
- Summer Internship Projects, Experimental/Laboratory methods and Activity-centered Methods enhance the learning experiences.

Students actively participate in a myriad of activities like NCC/NSS, Sports activities and other competitions. To imbibe patriotic and social values among students various Days like Teachers? Day, Independence Day, Republic Day, NSS Day, NCC Day, and Anniversaries of national heroes are celebrated. NSS & NCC conduct activities like Blood Donation Camps, AIDS Awareness Campaigns, Tree Plantation, De-addiction Drives, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, etc to make the students responsible citizens.

Problem solving Methodologies

Problem-solving components are included in various parts of most departments' prescribed curricula. Various departments, in addition to the prescribed syllabus, use other problem-solving methods such as Seminars and Competitions. To develop creativity, originality of ideas, reasoning, indepth knowledge and to make classroom interaction more effective 'Brainstorming method' is used. Various projects that involve problem solving techniques are assigned to the students of BBA, BCA and other departments. Discussions with their respective mentors also assist the students in enhancing their problem solving ability.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

The role of ICT in teaching learning has increased drastically since the Covid Pandemic. As a consequence, teachers are combining technology with traditional mode of instruction to engage students in long term learning. College uses Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in education to support, enhance, and optimize the delivery of education.

The following tools are used by the Institute-

ICT Tools:

- 1. Projectors- projectors are available in different classrooms/labs
- 2. Desktop and Laptops- Arranged at Computer Lab and Faculty cabins all over the campus.
- 3. Printers- They are installed at Labs, HOD Cabins and all prominent places.
- 4. Photocopier machines Multifunction printers are available at all prominent places in the institute. There are four photostat machines available in campus.
- 5. Scanners- Multifunction printers are available at all prominent places.
- 6. Seminar Rooms- Three seminar halls are equipped with all digital facilities.
- 7. Smart Board- Many smart boards are installed in the classrooms
- 8. Eighteen Interactive Boards are installed in the college
- 9. Online Classes through Zoom, Google Meet, Microsoft Team, Google Classroom)
- 10. MOOC Platform (NPTEL, SWAYAM)
- 11. Digital Library resources (NLIST, etc)

Use of ICT By Faculty-

- 1. **PowerPoint presentations** Faculties are encouraged to use power-point presentations in their teaching by using LCD's and projectors. They are also equipped by digital library, online search engines and websites to prepare effective presentations.
- 2. **Industry Connect** Seminar and Conference room are digitally equipped where guest lectures, expert talks and various competitions are regularly organized for students.
- 3. **Online quiz** Faculties prepare online quiz for students after the completion of each unit with the help of GOOGLE FORMS.
- 4. Video Conferencing- Students are counseled with the help of Zoom / Google meet applications.
- 5. **Video lecture** Recording of video lectures is made available to students for long term learning and future referencing.
- 6. **Online competitions** Various technical events and management events such as Poster making, Admad show, Project presentations, Business quiz, Debates, paper presentations etc. are being organized with the help of various Information Communication Tools.
- 7. Workshops- Teachers use various ICT tools for conducting workshops
- 8. Teachers have started taking lectures online on Google Meet, Zoom, Microsoft Teams, etc. FDPs are conducted to enable/familiarize the teachers with these online platforms. Besides using the e-books in the e-classrooms, educational podcasts and videos, such as Ted Talks, YouTube Content, etc which further adds quality to lecture delivery.
- 9. The college has an Automated Library which enables the students to find the location of the books easily. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Our college as a constituent college of Cluster University of Jammu, adheres to university regulations regarding all matters pertaining to syllabi, evaluation, and examination, which are governed by the university statutes. Internal assessment (including Practical and Theory) is carried out in accordance with the University's Statutes. According to the statutes, students must have at least 75% attendance in order to take both minor and major exams. Every teacher conducts a series of orientation lectures for freshers at the start of the semester to familiarise them with the examination and evaluation process. In this regard the mentor also guides the students throughout the session. Following procedures and steps ensure the transparency and robustness of the mechanism of internal assessment:

• Internal assessment (minor exam) is conducted for each course as per the framework provided in the University statues. An examination committee comprising of 8-10 teaching faculty members is entrusted with the responsibility of conducting the internal examinations in the College. It is

assisted by a dedicated examination section comprising of non-teaching staff members.

- One minor examination for UG courses and two minor examinations for PG courses are held in each semester in accordance with the University guidelines.
- A centralized date sheet for minor examinations is prepared by the examination committee and displayed on the notice board as well as website at least one week in advance. Teachers from different subjects are deputed as invigilators to ensure transparent and fair conduct of exam.
- The answers sheets are evaluated in a time bound manner and the marks are displayed on the notice boards of the concerned departments.
- Minor test answer scripts are shown to the students so that the students trust the fairness of the evaluation. It further ensures the accountability of teachers.
- The attendance and internal assessment records are uploaded to the University's online portal, where students can view them.
- Heads of the departments are empowered to re-assess the answer scripts in case of any grievances.
- During the COVID pandemic the minor examinations have been conducted using secure platforms like Google form, wise app etc. In the subjects having practical examinations, the practicals are conducted by the concerned department in coordination with the examination section to avoid overlapping of dates with other subjects.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

Our college is a constituent college of Cluster University of Jammu and therefore it follows the guidelines set by the University for the conduct of examinations. The final exams also known as Major exams for each paper has 80%(60%) weightage of overall assessment and the remaining 20%(40%) constitute minor assessment marks for UG (PG) Courses. The college has a well-structured mechanism to ensure the proper redressal of the exam related grievances.

- The Internal Assessment forms a part of a continuous evaluation system conducted through Class Tests, Assignments, Projects and Presentations. All of these together constitute an integral part of Internal Examination which is carried out in a well-planned and systematic manner.
- Sometimes students are not able to appear in the internal examinations due to their participation in NCC camps, sports tournaments or some other unavoidable circumstances have to contact their concerned teacher and with the permission of the HOD they get an option to appear in a retest which is usually held a month before the start of the external examinations.
- After the evaluation of answer sheets, the marks are displayed on the notice board of the concerned department. The College has also adopted an online system where each student can view her assessment marks minor marks as well as major marks.
- o A time of one week is provided to the students within which any student can approach his/her

concerned teacher if he/she is not satisfied with the marks awarded. If the student is still dissatisfied then he/she may approach the concerned HOD who may get the answer copy rechecked. After the completion of all this process the marks of internal assessment are uploaded on the university portal. In case there is any discrepancy (which is very rare) in uploading these marks, the student can again approach the concerned HOD. The HOD upon checking the record has to recommend the rectification of marks of that student to the examination section of the college which is then communicated to the university.

- There is a Committee at the University level that looks into any discrepancies in Internal Assessment marks and takes requisite steps to ensure transparency and objectivity. If any error is detected in the final mark-sheet in spite of rigorous scrutiny, it is promptly reported to the University by the College.
- Any query of students regarding discrepancy in marks' upload is thoroughly addressed by the respective teachers/HODs. The marks are locked at the University portal only after each student has been given ample opportunity and time to review and register his complaint, if any.

Thus the College employs a robust multi-tier mechanism to ensure transparency and objectivity in dealing with grievances and thereby ensuring an examination system which is fair, trustworthy and equitable.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

Response:

The program outcome encompasses a wide range of knowledge, abilities, and attitudes that the students acquire while pursuing their course. The college offers a variety of courses and each course has a distinct and well-defined outcome. Different courses' specific learning outcomes are built into each discipline's curriculum and is available on the website of Cluster university of Jammu. The Program Outcomes (PO) and Course Outcomes (CO) adopted by the institution for all programmes (Sciences, Arts, BCA, BBA) are in accordance with UGC guidelines. The Program Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework is designed to meet students' current needs in terms of securing a path to higher education or a terminal degree, as well as guiding students toward career choices.

- The Programmes offered by the institution are uploaded on the institutional and university website. The Syllabus of each program prepared by the Cluster University of Jammu is communicated to the students by the teachers and is also available on the website.
- The learning objectives are also communicated through a variety of means, including an information brouchure, the principal's address to students and parents, alumni meetings, and informal sessions conducted by their respective mentors. These are also prominently displayed on

college bulletin boards and college magazines.

- The teachers also introduce the students to the specific areas in which they are going to gain knowledge. The teachers of every department instruct the student that at the end of each program, what they are supposed to obtain. The program outcomes of all the subjects are clearly made known to the students.
- The students' doubts and confusion are clarified by the teachers. Throughout the programm duration through various tests and examinations, their attainment is assessed and suggestions for improvement are given.
- The curriculum of a program is designed by the University. However, many College teachers serve as member of the Board of Studies and provide regular feedback regarding the difficulties faced by students in attaining the course outcomes or programme outcomes.
- Teachers are also delegated by the college to attend workshops, seminars, conferences, and FDPs to expand their teaching and learning experiences in the classroom. Teachers participate actively in university-sponsored workshops on curriculum revision too.
- Many teachers also serve on syllabus subcommittees, ensuring that teaching and learning quality is
 improved. Alumni students are also invited to participate with both students and teachers at special
 events and meetings, where they describe how their specific courses influenced their career, thereby
 assisting current students.

The institution communicates the Program outcomes and course outcomes to the teachers and students through following means-

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

The Institution regularly evaluates the performance of students through various formative and summative methods for measuring the attainment of each of the Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes. The programme outcomes and Programme Specific outcomes are assessed with the help of

- 1. Internal and External Assessment: Internal assignments are given to the students which are mostly aligned with Programme Outcomes of the respective subject. External Assessment is evaluated by external experts for the Practical examinations, appointed by the University for conduct of Viva-Voce and evaluation of practical files.
- 2. Institutional Examination and Tests: Students are assessed and evaluated throughout the year at institutional level through unit test, surprise test, terminal examination and the performance of the student is analysed for assessing the attainment level of programme outcomes and programme specific outcomes.
- 3. Feedback Evaluation: The Institution collects feedback from students, Alumni, Employers and Parents which is an important method of measuring attainment with objectives of identifying the attainment level of students in terms of programme, subject, course and syllabus outcomes and to understand the impact of teaching learning process.
- 4. Internships: Students are encouraged to take up internships, projects, fieldwork, etc. This helps them to obtain necessary skills and practical experience in their chosen discipline.
- 5. Placements: One of the most important Programme Outcomes of Undergraduate Degree is the employability of students upon successful completion of their degree programme. The college has a vibrant Placement Cell, which caters to the demands of companies from different sectors.
- 6. Higher Studies: Another parameter to measure attainment of POs, PSOs and COs is through progression of students towards higher studies in educational institutions for post-graduation in Indian and Foreign Universities. Throughout the year the faculty records the performance of each student on each programme
- 7. Group discussions and seminars are also organized and each student is made to participate compulsorily in these programmes. Through the seminars and group discussions, the thinking process of the students is also assessed and the skills and knowledge are also tested.
- 8. Some activities like quiz competitions are also held which makes the institution know about the knowledge and information of the students.
- 9. At the Departmental level, the Heads of the Department and the teachers who are engaged in any class strive to complete the courses in time and in some cases, extra classes are conducted for the students who they identify as relatively average.
- 10. The end semester examination of every course is based on a written examination of three hours, the question paper of which is required to test the knowledge of the student from every unit prescribed for study.
- 11. The college has also utilized a student satisfaction survey developed by NAAC (for conducting it during the assessment and accreditation process). College used this to seek feedback on its own, for measuring the attainment level of course, and programme outcomes. This is shared through the college webpage to all stakeholders so that they remain informed of the virtues and shortcomings in teaching-learning and accomplishments.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

Institute has created an ecosystem for innovations and has taken several initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge like:

- Research Hub and spoke- The college has a research hub for social sciences and spoke for mass communication and multimedia and music and fine arts and languages. Research hub and spoke are well equipped with infrastructure and research-related software that facilitate students in their early stages of research and fieldwork analysis as the college is running PG and Honors program. Further, it also provides an opportunity for faculty to carry out their research work

- Browsing Centre: The institute has a Browsing Centre. Both the students and faculty have access to it and it helps them in their respective areas and thus creating an ecosystem for innovations.
- Library and laboratories: The college has an automated library which is well equipped with books from all the areas. All the departments that carry out any experimental work have laboratories that are well equipped with all the tools that are required to conduct the same.

3.4 Extension Activities

India is the birthplace of Yoga and by participating in International Yoga Day students become global stakeholders in ensuring a healthy body and mind.

Programs like 'Save our Lakes', tree plantation drive in collaboration with the Department of the forest, cleaning of Tawi have been taken up as part of environmental consciousness and encouraging the community to initiate steps in this regard. Blood donation camps in the College are a regular feature whereby students and staff donate blood for the cause. Participation in NSS Republic Day Celebrations in New Delhi, Adoption of Village, Anti-Plastic rally, Peace Rally, connects students with the larger social issues in the community and makes them socially responsible and sensitive and thus facilitates the holistic development. The impact of these activities on the students/volunteers in the last five years can be summed up as follows:

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The Institution ensures adequate availability and optimal utilization of physical infrastructure as it is critically linked to the vision of the college—'to create an environment of excellence in education' through technologically advanced pedagogical tools. The Institution is spread over 19.58 acres of land with 8867sq m built up area and has sufficient infrastructure in terms of administrative block, academic blocks, classrooms, laboratories, seminars halls, examination halls etc. The campus is spread in six blocks, viz Main Block, Earth Sciences Block, Scie0nces Block, New Block, Administrative Block, and Library. Effective utilization and maintenence of infrastructure is ensured by the Advisory Committee, Time Table Committee and Development Committee.

50% of the classrooms are well equipped with ICT tools like smart boards for better and effective teaching-learning and the entire build up area is wi-fi enabled. Institution has eight science departments; the laboratories of each department acts as the backbone for providing hands on practical training to the students. The Laboratories are well equipped with latest equipments, and are maintained by the respective departments. The Institution has also established a Browsing Centre for facilitating the students. In addition to this, Institution has also established E-content centre for the creation of e-content as an addittional support to the students and is also equipped with an ICT enabled Conference/Seminar hall with seating capacity of atleast 50 people for conducting seminars, conferences, webinars etc. A Research Hub has also been established in the Institution to promote the research ecosystem.

The library of the Institution is fully automated and has approximately 60000 text books. The issue and return of books has been activated in the library by the installed software, KOHA. Several weekly/monthly magazines and newspapers have been subscribed for the benefit of the students. The library also provides access to UGC funded Text-Books Section (Book Bank), e-journals, e-books through N-List to students and faculty. The library is fully air-conditioned, Wi-Fi enabled and has a seating capacity of 65-80 users. The ground floor as well as the first floor has a reading room facility for the students and faculty respectively. The library is also equipped with the CCTV surveillance cameras.

The Institution also offers space and other infrastructural facilities for IGNOU study center since year 2000, biggest Study centre in North Zone with an nrollment of 2000 students in each session, January and July Session. Counselling classes are also conducted by approved counselors of IGNOU beyond regular college hours. The college also provides Practical Lab facility to the IGNOU Science Stream students. The available physical infrastructure is optimally utilized beyond regular college hours for conducting external examinations by other agencies.

4.1.2 The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Response:

Institution believes in the all-round development of students. There is a lot of encouragement for the students to participate in sports and cultural activities. The Institute has adequate facilities for sports, games (indoor and outdoor) and cultural activities. The total area of sports and games fields is 22503 sq. m. Institute has playgrounds with provision for multiple games, such as, Cricket, Football, Volleyball, Kabaddi and Kho-kho. The Institution has a spacious and well equipped Multi purpose Sports Complex, where students play indoor games like table tennis, badminton, chess, carrom etc. Institution has a Sports Committee which looks after the maintenance and augmentation of the sports infrastrucure. Qualified PTI has been appointed, who works in cooordination with the sports committe. Based on the Sports calendar designed at the beginning of academic session, PTI organizes various sports competitions and selection trials for various inter-collegiate/state/National level tournaments. College teams are prepared for participation in National Level, State level, University level and intercollegiate competitions. Outdoor games such as badminton, volley ball, cricket, football, kabaddi, hand ball, kho-kho etc., are well practiced and played by the students. As a result, Cricket Team, Footbal Team and Kabadi Teams have been consistently performing exceptionally well in all the intercollegiate competitions and also a number of students have excelled in other games and bagged Gold, Silver and Bronze medals for the institution. Celebration of Yoga Day has become a regular affair and students and staff actively participates in the same. College has two NCC wings -NCC Naval and NCC army with a capacity of 100 students per unit and Two NSS Units consisting of 100 students in each unit.

Cultural Committee headed by one of the Senior faculty looks after the cultural activities and the infrastructural development for the cultural activities. Students are very much encouraged to participate in the cultural events held in the college like Induction for Freshers, Annual Sports Day, Annual Day, Farewell etc., to exhibit cultural talents. Students are even sent to other colleges to participate in the intercollegiate competitions like singing, dancing, skits, mimicries etc. At present, a state of the art auditorium is being constructed and is expected to be handed over to the Institution in 2022. With the completion of auditorium, Institution shall also be able to host several mega cultural and academic events. The Department of Music is well equipped with the requisite infrastructure including Tablas, Sitar, Dholak, Tanpura, Harmonium, Synthesiser etc and at present offers Bachelors and Masters Degree Programes in Music. National Independence Day and Republic Day are celebrated in the Institution by unfurling the national flag followed by a guard of honor to the Chief Guest by NCC Cadets. Institution has several Clubs/ Committees to enhance the hidden talent of the students namely: Red Ribbon Club, Unnat Bharat Abhiyaan, Aatma Nirbhar Bharat Abhiyaan. Sports & Games Committee play an excellent role for over all development of the student's community.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Response:

For the efficient and smooth working, Institutional library is fully automated with Integrated Library Management System through KOHA 19.5 version and has its own mechanism and system in place to identify the purchases based on the courses offered. The library is well stocked with a collection of approximately 60000 text books. For the ease of tracing the books, Library has created different sections for individual subjects. Several weekly/monthly magazines and newspapers have been subscribed for the benefit of the students. The library also provides access to UGC funded Text-Books Section to students and faculty. Library has also subscribed e-journals through N-List (National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content) and has access to more than 6000 e-journals under the e-shodhsindhu program of INFLIBNET. The College library is open for students and staff during the college hours on all working days. The library is fully air-conditioned; Wi-Fi enabled, differently abled friendly and has a seating capacity of 65-80 users. The ground floor of the library has a property counter, librarian's room, circulation (Issue/Return) counter, Online Public Access Catalogue, Text-Book Section, Periodical Section. The ground floor as well as the first floor has a reading room facility for students and faculty, respectively. A visitor record is maintained for students and faculty members. The library is equipped with CCTV surveillance cameras.

Virtual library: A Virtual library has been created and link has been provided on college website. It can be accessed at https://sites.google.com/view/governmentmamlibrary/home. The virtual library also provides access to e-content created by constituent colleges of the Cluster university of Jammu for students

e-Resources: The library is a member of **N-LIST & NDL** consortia of information library network (INFLIBNET). Under this consortia, library provides more than 3000000 e-books and 6000 e-journals to students and faculty member.

Library Automation: College library is automated using KOHA 19.05 version. Books widely in circulation have been updated in the library software database and online public access catalogue (KOHA)

is available for students and faculty members. The issue and return of books have been recently activated in the library software KOHA.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

Response:

Continuous upgradation of Technology and Infrastructure is one of the quality policies of the Institution. The Institution provides IT enabled teaching-learning environment in the campus round the clock. New IT equipments are purchased as per the requirements. IT facilities have been updated on regular basis.

In session 2016-17, 01 Laptop (i3 processor, 4 GB RAM, 250 GB HDD) was purchased for IQAC. In addition to it, 01 HP Laser Printer was purchased and issued to Administrative office for Official Purposes.

In session 2017-18, 07 HP Laser Printers were purchased for Principal Chamber, Accounts Section, Admin Section, Physics department, Geography department and IQAC Department. In addition to it, 11 All In One desktop (i3, 4 GB RAM, 500 GB HDD) were purchased to upgrade existing departments. A Heavy Duty Photocopier machine was also purchased for Examination Wing (Jammu University) for smooth conduct of Examination related activities.

In session 2018-19, 07 HP Laser Printers for teaching departments and library were purchased.

In session 2019-20, 09 desktops (with i5, 8GB RAM, 1 TB HDD) was purchased to upgrade the College IT Infrastructure. 05 desktops were issued to BCA department for Lab Up-gradation followed by 01 each to Electronics, Principal Office, library and IQAC Department. 01 Heavy Duty Printer was also purchased for Accounts Section. With rise in Covid-19 Cases, 04 laptops were purchased and issued to BCA, IQAC, Examination Wing and IQAC. In addition to this, 22 CCTV Cameras (02 DVR's of 4 TB each) with display in Principal Chamber were installed in the Institution for Overall supervision. A photocopier machine was also purchased and installed in Institutional Staff room for Printing Answer scripts of online examination and other Examination related purposes. 06 Interactive Smart Display Panels were installed in 06 classrooms of New block of the college. 10 new broadband connections were issued to BCA, Statistics, Mathematics, Geology, Geography, Library, Examination Section (Cluster University), Principal Chamber and Accounts Section for teaching-learning and official correspondence purposes.

In 2020-21, 12 Interactive Panels (Intel Core i5, 7th generation, 8GB Ram, 1TB HDD, toughened glass) have been purchased for effective Teaching Learning Process. The college has also established a Browsing Centre consisting of 20 All In One PC's (i3,8GB RAM, Windows 10,1TB HDD),01 Online UPS (6.0Kva), Hard Disk 1TB, All in One Heavy Duty Photocopier Machine, CCTV Cameras (Consisting of 1 DVR and 04 CCTV Cameras with Storage 1 TB)for facilitating students. In addition to this, College has also established E-content centre, an All in One Heavy Duty Photocopier Machine, an Interactive display Panel, 01 Server Machine, PTZ Camera has been purchased. In addition to Browsing Centre & E-content Centre, Institution has also made purchases to set up Mass Communication and Multimedia Production Centre and Music, Fine Arts and Languages Centre. IT Infrastructure consisting of an Interactive display Panel (Intel Core i5, 7th generation, 8GB Ram, 1TB HDD, toughened glass) for each centre has been purchased. Institution has modified its Internet plan from Broadband connections to High Speed Fiber Connections.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response:

There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities such as laboratory, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. in the Institution. College Development Committee plays vital role in the overall developmental works of the Institution. The maintenance of physical, academic and support facilities are carried out by the respective departments with the help of in house staff on daily basis and periodically. And care has been taken to keep the equipments, machines etc. in working conditions. In case of breakdowns, standard procedure is followed to bring the equipment/machine in working condition. A well-defined procedure developed by the Purchase Committee looks after all the purchases in the Institution. All the purchases are made through GeM Portal as per GFR Rules 2017 after obtaining Requisitions, Minutes of Meeting from concerned Committees and Head of Departments. The Institution strictly adheres to the rules and regulations put forth by the Higher Education

Department and Finance Department of the Jammu and Kashmir Union Territory. External audits are done annually. If any discrepancy is found in financial records, a query is put up for the concerned offices/officials. The information about all the gazetted and non-gazetted employees is maintained on the Centralized Personnel Information System (CPIS) as directed by the Union Territory Government. Maintenance and proper utilization of hostel infrastructure is ensured by the Hostel Committee and Wardens. Sufficient staff is provided for the overall supervision and safety of the boarders. Also hostels have their own well-furnished mess which provides food at affordable rates to the boarders. The Institution has its own examination wing for the purpose of conducting minor and major examinations. Examination Committee looks after the maintenance and augmentation of the infrastructure required for the smooth conduct of the various internal and external examinations. Institution has also created a College IT Cell which facilitates overall IT related activities. Institute has its own canteen inside the campus and a tender is floated annually and accordingly it is allotted to desired agency based on the lowest and genuine rates. Canteen Committee ensures the proper functioning of the canteen and assess the requirements based on the feedback received from the students and staff. Also quality of the food is ensured by the Canteen committee. Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) of all the modern teaching learning technology, proper reporting system about repairs and replacements are the basic attributes of classroom management.

A brief description is presented below on maintenance and utilization of some facilities.

Laboratories (All Labs & Computer centre):

Each laboratory has Lab Assistant and Lab Bearer. Lab Assistant is responsible for maintaining and upgrading the laboratory with necessary equipments from time to time, to cope with change in the syllabus. Preventive maintenance and performance monitoring is carried out. Every Lab Assistant keeps the record of utilization of equipments, computers and other required material for experiments.

Library:

Librarian with supporting staff has been appointed to maintain central library. They focus is on the availability and utilization of instructional material in teaching and learning process. At the end of the Academic year stock verification is done. Librarian prepares the report on the same and utilization of books by the students and staff. Procurement of books as per the requirement is initiated through library committee by inviting the requirement of books from various departments and then processed following the procurement procedure.

Sports Complex/Ground/Equipment's:

PTI of the Institution looks after the sports facilities and the activities. The sports equipment's are issued to the students as per the schedule of the events. PTI submits proposal for maintenance and repair of damaged equipments. Preventive maintenance measures are taken well in time. PTI is also responsible for keeping the record of utilization of Sports Facilities, activities held, awards for the students etc.

Class Rooms:

Classrooms are allocated to all the departments along with necessary ICT tools. The classrooms are utilized as per the time table of the departments. The classrooms are cleaned on daily basis and are monitored by the Section Officer. Head of the Institute, Head of Departments and Class teachers also

monitor the cleanliness and ensure that the cleanliness is maintained in the class rooms with the help of safai karamcharis. To make the Institution specially abled friendly, ramps have also been constructed for in all blocks.

IT facilities:

All the departments have been equipped with adequate IT Infrastructure, essential softwares and peripherals. The Lab Assistants maintain the IT facilities in the respective departments.

Electrical, Drinking water coolers, etc.:

Institution has employed technicians (electrician and plumber) for up keeping and maintenance of electrical and water facilities. Institution has also appointed housekeeping staff to maintain the gardens and lawns.

CCTV, Security etc.:

The Institution is fully equipped with CCTV security system. Security staff including guards and gate keeper are employed to safe guard the whole premises. To further augment the safety, identity cum library cards are issued to every student for their verification at the time of entry in the college.

The Principal is the administrative head of the institution. He has decentralized his powers among the different members of staff. In certain cases under special circumstances the important decisions are taken after consultation with the College Advisory Committee. Different committees like College Development Committee, College purchaseCommittee, College library Committee, College Dicipline Committee, Sports and Cultural and various other committees are formed for smooth functioning of the college. The senior faculty member act as the convener with 8 to 10 faculty members acting as members of the committee. The decisions pertaining to different committees are taken up in different meetings held from time to time in the presence of the Principal. Each department in the College is looked after by the senior most faculty member designated as Head of the Department who frames the strategic planning, authorizing each faculty member to take up certain duties like conduct of class work, internal examinations and extra- curricular activities. The non teaching staff of the department is governed by the head for proper functioning of the respective components. Administrative section is headed by SO (Section Officer). The institutional Strategic /Perspective plan of the college is to focus on the ICT based education, to cope

up with the modern technology and provide students all the basic infrastructure, which can be benificial for the students, moreover in view of the covid-19 pandamic like situation. In the last three years College has installed 20 interactive panels in different departments and different class rooms supported by internet connectivity, so that the teachers can interact with students in both online and offline mode and the teachers can display and teach the lessons supported by audio visual aids.. Now these interactive panels supported class rooms can be considered as smart classrooms and has made teaching learning process more easy for teachers and students. The teachers and students can also surf or brouse any video or material available from the internet related to their subject and also saves the precious time of both teachers and students.

The principal in the beginning of the session in consultation with the Advisory Committee, Heads of the Departments and the Development Committee of the College discusses about infrastructural requirement of the different teaching departments as per the number of the students admitted in the college. As per the requirement of different departments and availability of funds, funds are allocated for strengthening and upgrading of the infrastructure.

The funds are allocated on priority basis for those activities in the first phase which needs immediate attention and thereafter, for subsequent activities. This ensures timely addrassal of genuine requirements of the institute.

Functions of the Organizational Structure

He/ She can take any action which is required for the promotion of quality education. Principal of the institution prepares all the agenda items, conducts the meeting and takes initiatives for the betterment of the institution. He provides leadership and guidance to implement all the academic activities in compliance

with the University rules and regulations. To initiate all the development activities, principal monitors the progress and reports to the Commissioner/ Sectary from time to time. IQAC is responsible for fixing quality parameters for various academic and administrative activities. The IQAC cell of the institution had played a significant role in documenting various programmes/ academic activities from time to time. As per the university/ government guidelines, IQAC Cell constitutes different committees at the college level which consists of faculty members as conveners and 8 to 10 committee members. Convener looks after the committee programme and its operation. Every committee has well defined roles and responsibilities. Each activity conducted by the committee is as per the standard operating procedures laid down by the head of the institution. Head of the Department (HOD) prepares departmental workload as per the guidelines and is submitted to the head of the institution. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

Teaching

There are several welfare schemes framed by the JK Higher education department meant for teaching and non-teaching staff—which can improve the atmosphere of the workplace including infrastructure and academic aspects. The college administration permits the teaching staff to undergo different professional development programmes like refresher courses, orientation programmes, workshops and seminars. At a time, only 20 of the faculty is allowed to attend any course outside the institution. The college also organizes workshops and seminars for the development of its faculty members. The college teachers are also allowed to undergo Ph.D post doctorate programmes for the career advancement. They are also allowed to attend professional training organized by the state Govt. for their promotion. There is also a provision for financial aid in case of any medical emergency for teachers, Teacher Welfare Fund is deducted from the remuneration of exam duties and evaluation which can be claimed in case of medical emergency. Some other Welfare measures for teachers are:

Hygienic working environment, Well maintained, individual work stations, Annual and special increments on emoluments, 3 increments on award of Ph.D, during the service, 2 increments for M.Phil qualification. Vacation leave based on academic calendar Casual, Maternity, Child Care and Sick Leave as per rules Paternity leave for male employees Medical leave Duty leave for attending conferences, congresses, symposia and seminars, delivering lectures in institutes and colleges. Medical assurance from ICICI Lombard for Insurance of teaching staff members for ease in accessibility to comprehensive health services. In case of any adversity College Teachers Association (CTA) and faculty members also contribute.

Non-Teaching

The college also addresses the grievances of the non-teaching staff through the Grievance Redressal Cell headed by the chair. Computer Trainings are also organized for the non-teaching staff by the college. They are also allowed to attend professional training organized by the state Govt. for their promotion.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The Principal and the committee of the college monitors the use of funds received from the state-Govt./UGC/RUSA. The funds received from UGC/RUSA/State Govt. clearly mention for which purpose they are granted. The institute has at its disposal the funds collected from the students as part of admission fees as local fund and can be used for the welfare of students with approval from administrative department wherever necessary. The mobilization of funds is done by the Principal as per requirement of different departments of college. Institute maintains & follows a well-planned process for the mobilization of funds and resource. The process involves various committees of the institute as well as the Department Heads and Accounts office. Institute has designed some specific rules for the fund usage and resource utilization. Mobilization of Funds, the student fee is the major source of income for the institute. For utilization of funds development, purchase and local committee has been constituted to monitor the optimum utilization of funds.

The college administration ensures that all purchases are made through GeM portal. However, in case of products and services which are not available on GeM a certificate of non-availability of the articles is downloaded and the College purchase committee seeks quotations from vendors for the purchase of equipment. The quotations are scrutinized by the account officer and purchase committee before a final decision is made based on parameters like pricing, quality, terms of service, etc. The Principal and purchase committees along with the accounts department ensure that the expenditure lies within the allotted budget. The institutional budget includes expenses such as salary, electricity, internet charges, stationary & other maintenance costs. It includes planned expenses such as lab equipment purchases, furniture, and other development Expenses. The budget is scrutinized and approved by the top management Accounts section of the college and Purchase Committee monitor's whether expenses are exceeding budgetary provisions. Effective utilization of infrastructure is ensured through the appointment of adequate and well-qualified lab technicians & system administrators. The optimal utilization is ensured through encouraging innovative teaching learning practices. The college infrastructure is also utilized for Government examinations/University Examinations, IGNOU, and other competitive conduct of examinations on week ends.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

IQAC is one of the major policy making and implementing unit in our college. It works hard for upgrading the college infrastructure and all support facilities to meet the standards of higher education and growing need of students. The IQAC of the college proposed various green practices to maintain eco-friendly college campus through the activities i.e. Tree Plantation, Plastic Eradication, Clean and Beautiful Campus, Waste Management etc. Because of these practices, eco-friendly and pollution free college campus and social awareness about renewable energy and waste management is developed in the community. The use of ICT tools has become an integral part in teaching -learning process. IQAC always encouraged teachers to utilize these tools in classroom teaching and laboratories. The IQAC has advised the administration to enrich ICT infrastructure by purchasing advanced ICT tools, broadband internet Wi-Fi facility. Periodically IQAC has trained teachers and non-teaching staff to use ICT etc. The educational use of social media has also been utilized to establish communication with the students and peers. The teachers of College use ICT enabled tools like Interactive Boards, Projectors, Computers etc. for effective teaching. The use of ICT has become an effective tool for teaching- learning. Its efficacy in improving the conceptual understanding among the students has been recognised. ICT tools also help the teachers in providing varying content to the students according to their learning pace and interests. The college has taken many steps towards improving the ICT enabled teaching during the year 2020-21. More so in the context of the COVID pandemic where it became absolutely essential for the teachers to use ICT tools as the classes were held online during the most part of the academic year except for a brief period of 2-3 months in the first quarter of 2021. Following steps have been taken to strengthen the usage of ICT tools for teaching learning process in this college. Eighteen Smart/interactive Boards in Classrooms and two interactive Boards in Labs have been used for the offline teaching as well as for recording lectures. Meetings of the College Committees using Zoom/Google meet, webinars by Career Counseling Cell, Psychological Counselling Cell or different Departments brought to forefront the usage of ICT tools in education. A faculty Development Programme conducted on Digital Initiatives like creation/use of E Content, use of browsing center, use of Smart Interactive Boards for teaching learning process on 16th March 2021 for the teaching faculty of the college to acquaint them with the advancements in Technology. The objective of the event was to train the faculty for the use of High Tech Digital Techniques for formal and non-formal education with practical orientations. With the guidance of IQAC, An e-content room has been established exclusively to provide teachers a platform for creating high quality e-content. A browsing centre has also been established to give students access to the high speed internet. The research hub of the college is also well equipped with the latest ICT tools.

Maulana Azad College was awarded grade "B" in the NAAC Cycle II in 2014. The NAAC peer team, had pointed out that though the Institution had a teaching faculty, which was diligent, devoted and dedicated, yet it needed to contribute to research and publications. Traditionally, research at the undergraduate college level is not given much importance. However, the IQAC recognised research by faculty as an important aspect of the teaching-learning process. The IQAC has initiated various measures to support teachers in their engagement with academic research and publications. All the teachers are encouraged to publish papers in different journals. The College regularly organises lectures, workshops, and faculty development programs for teachers in which research methodologies and objectives are discussed by experts. IQAC encourages teachers to undertake research and significantly contribute to their respective and interdisciplinary fields. In the past five years, there has been considerable increase in research and publication.

The IQAC constantly monitors the teaching quality, programme delivery and achievement of learning outcomes, through Feedback Process. Teacher develops Lesson Plans for the course/papers that he/she is teaching. It helps in designing and aligning the pedagogy, various co-curricular events and assessment practices to the requirements of the learners and learning outcomes of the course/paper. The teachers review the importance of values like socio-cultural inclusivity, punctuality and consistency. Through the teachers' responses, the IQAC evaluates the teaching-learning process, academic activities, research policy and management, infrastructure, library resources, College's policies and procedures, along with considering the requirement for upgradation. The IQAC suggests to the administration measures to further enrich and maintain the institutional quality. 2. Objectives of the Practice

Now days teaching are not limited to lecturing in the classroom, dictating notes to the students and evaluating students based on cramming the notes. Teaching is much beyond this." Technology will not replace great teachers but technology in the hands of great teachers can be transformational (... George Couros). Use of technology in teaching-learning process generates meaningful results not only for teachers but for students also.

The objectives of Faculty Development Programmes are

- 1. To understand use of technology in education and identify key issues and challenges faced by the faculty of Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu.
- 2. To familiarize teachers of the college with use of technology in teaching-learning process.
- 3. To make teaching-learning process more interesting and enjoyable both for teachers and students.

3. The Context

The entire world is moving towards digitization. Teaching is not confined to four walls of classroom. Now a day's students learn in a global classroom. When information is available at a click of a button, Students are more inclined to find information through internet using their mobile phones and computers. So a need for creation and dissemination of e-content was felt. Creation and dissemination of knowledge is very important, so that students get the right knowledge without wasting their time. In this context teacher are to be trained to create and disseminate e-content. The pandemic of COVID-19 has changed the way of life so is the teaching learning process. The online class over mobile phone and computer has temporarily replaced the routing functioning of classroom teaching. In this regard need was felt to aware teacher about various online classroom software, tools available to create assignments, online examination and its evaluation.

4. The Practice

Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu has a practice of training its faculty about the use of technology in teaching learning process to make it more meaningful, interesting and enjoyable. The college keeps on organising in house faculty improvement programmes for the faculty and by the faculty of the College, thereby saving both time and money. The Faculty Improvement program mainly aim at training teachers about use of smart interactive panels, use of power point presentation, creation of e-content using different techniques and software such as SANKORE. Teachers are trained about online mode of teaching

and evaluation.

FDP on Online Teaching Technologies

Department of Computer Sciences, Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu in wake of Pandemic Covid-19 and in the interest of academics organized a 03 Days Faculty Development Programme webinar on "E-learning Tools for Teaching and Learning" w.e.f 01st June-03rd June 2020. Online webinars has emerged as a new platform for online studies. The teachers should be well equipped with the new online teaching technologies. This FDP was designed to cater this need of hour. Lectures were delivered online using Google meet and the participants were educated about the various e-learning tools like Google Classroom, Screencastify, WebEx and were given hands on training on creating Google forms, quizzes, assignments and were also given detailed training on sharing e-content from Google drives using different techniques. The participants were also made aware about the ethical standards that must be adhered while creating e-content. A total of 350 participants registered for the programme and attended the webinar.

FDP on e-learning and content creation

E-content committee in collaboration with IQAC of Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu organised two week long Faculty Development Programme on Digital Initiatives like creation/use of e-Content, use of browsing centre, use of Smart Interactive Boards for teaching learning process on 16th March 2021 for the teaching faculty of the college to acquaint them with the advancements in Technology. The objective of the event was to train the faculty for the use of High Tech Digital Techniques for formal and non-formal education with practical orientations. M.A.M College has taken a lead among all the colleges of the UT of J&K in organizing such programmes by faculty and for the faculty of the college. The faculty has been enabled to use Digital Content & Devices as to improve teaching learning process, thereby enhancing the educational opportunities for young learners. The rapid changes and shifting paradigms in Educational System has arisen the need of such programmes. The faculty Development program, which aimed at providing the knowledge and skill for teachers to cater to present day Global Challenges. In the FDP technical session and practice sessions were conducted on Operation of Digital interactive panels, Creation of e-content, dissemination of e-contents.

Total of 106 faculty members were benefited from the FDP.

Online Examination: As a learning outcome of faculty Development Programmes all examinations (minor as well as major) were successfully conducted during pandemic of COVID-19.

e- Content and Browsing Centre: The College has created its own e-content generation facility. The college is also created its browsing centre where both students and teachers have access to e-content.

Martyr's Day is celebrated in the memory of Amar Shaheed Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria (KC)(P)

On 28th September every year Martyr's Day or Shaheed Diwas is celebrated in the memory of Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria to pay tribute to extraordinary bravery and supreme scarifies by the son of the soil. No doubt, he has sacrificed his life for the safety and security of the country. He is a source of inspiration for the young students of the college. At such a young age, he came forward to serve the nation. On 28th September 2011 he fought with bravery against terrorist. So, to pay homage to Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria Martyr's Day is celebrated every year.

Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria was born on 28 Aug 1985 in district Samba of Jammu and Kashmir. Son of an army veteran Nb. Subedar Som Duttt Khajuria, Lt Khajuria completed his schooling from Kendriya Vidyalaya No. 1, Gandhi Nagar, and Jammu. He was second among four siblings with elder brother Anil, younger brother Sunil and sister Deepika. He joined the Officers' Training Academy (OTA) after completing his graduation from **Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu**, and was commissioned into the Army Service Corps on 20 March 2010. Lt Sushil Khajuria though commissioned into ASC was deputed to 18 Grenadiers unit deployed in J&K as his first operational assignment. Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria joined the unit at Panzgam on 14 April 2010.

He was made the Ghatak Platoon Commander from the beginning and was soon in combat, conducting counter-terrorist operations in the treacherous mountainous terrain of the frontiers of Kupwara in Jammu and Kashmir. His first real encounter was on 29 July 2011, where he gave an excellent account of himself and the battalion was successful in neutralizing one hardcore terrorist.

Kupwara Operation: 28Sep 2011

On 27 September 2011, Lt Sushil Khajuria was leading his team in a rugged and difficult terrain with steep slopes and thick undergrowth, simultaneously, coordinating movements with four other teams based on specific input by higher formation headquarters and a neighbouring formation about the presence of an

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infiltration column of approximately 5 to 6 terrorists in the general area of Kopra, in Kupwara district. The teams were launched on a search and destroy mission to deal with the terrorists. While scouting a nullah, his team came under heavy fire. With his buddy having pinned down by the terrorist fire and realizing that the terrorists were entrenched in an advantageous position behind a big rock, Lt Sushil

Khajuria crawled through thick foliage to a flank and spotted the terrorists under covering fire from his team. Unmindful of his personal safety, he charged at the terrorists, up the slope, killing two of them. During the operation Havaldar Ravi Kumar, the leading scout of another team got shot by the terrorists at around 10.30 hrs and was severely injured. Hav. Kumar could not move, under fire from the terrorists. Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria then volunteered to retrieve the injured Hav. Ravi Kumar. While crawling towards Hav, Lt Sushil Khajuria was fired upon by a terrorist and was severely injured. Lt Khajuria later succumbed to his injuries and was martyred. For his act of conspicuous gallantry, exceptional leadership and camaraderie Lt Sushil Khajuria was given the nation's second highest gallantry award during

Peace time, the "Kirti Chakra".Lt Sushil Khajuria is survived by his father Nb. Sub Som Dutt Khajuria (Retd), mother, brothers Col Anil Khajuria & Sunil Khajuria and sister Deepika.

The National Cadet Corps (NCC) of Maulana Azad Memorial College, Jammu organises and celebrates martyr's day to pay tributes to Martyr Lt. Sushil Khajuria, Aluminous of College, who made the martyr's supreme sacrifice of his life while fighting against militants at Kupwara on 28th September, 2011.

The parents and family members of the Martyr Lt. Sushil Khajuria are given special invitation for the occasion. Guard of Honour is presented to the parents of the Martyr. Traditional lamp/candles are lit in a patriotic atmosphere by parents of the Martyr and also by dignitaries present on the occasion.

This day is observed in the College to salute the martyrdom of brave soldier who lost his lives defending the sovereignty of the nation. On this occasion rich floral tributes are paid to martyr Lt. Sushil Khajuria. Chief guest who is from defence services/NCC addresses to NCC cadets/students of the College. This motivates cadets/students to join defence services and choose country over comfort, patriotism over convenience. The occasion of Martyrs' Day always reminds cadets/students of the College of the sacrifices of Amar Shaheed Lieutenant Sushil Khajuria (KC) (P) who sacrificed his life for us. He shall always remain a source of inspiration for all of us.
